Geography explores the world's cultural regions by examining location, physical characteristics, demographics, historical changes, economic activity, and land use.*

<p><b>Unit 1: People and Places</b></p> <p>In this unit, you'll gain some background in the origins of geography in order to get a sense of where and how this science began. This brief history will also give you some perspective on just how much our knowledge of geography has changed and grown. Glimpses into the travel journals of Marco Polo and the epic story of Odysseus, among others, reflect how imagination took the wheel when facts could go no further. You'll then get an overview of the many nationalities that make up Europe and pay a virtual visit to a selected country, keeping a travel journal of your stay. <p><b>Unit 3: Africa</b> In this unit, you will examine the topographical characteristics of Africa and discover its incredible animals and plants. In the process, you will take a virtual field trip to an African nation to study one of its ecosystems. You will get an overview of the many peoples and tribes that make up Africa and pay a virtual visit to a selected country, keeping a travel journal of your stay. <p><b>Unit 4: Asia</b> In Unit 4, you have a lot of ground to cover—millions of miles, in fact. Your virtual trek now takes you to the vast and extraordinarily diverse continent of Asia. Because Asia encompasses vast stretches of the planet, scores of countries, and hundreds of individual cultures, economies, and governments, the first lesson in this unit will include a general introduction to Asia through video clips. Once you have an overview of the region, you will explore its physical geography. In lesson 2, you'll explore the culture of India, in which ancient traditions and religions meet modern technology and lifestyles. You will then study the topic of overpopulation, learn about exponential growth, and learn the world’s population— 6.6 billion.
